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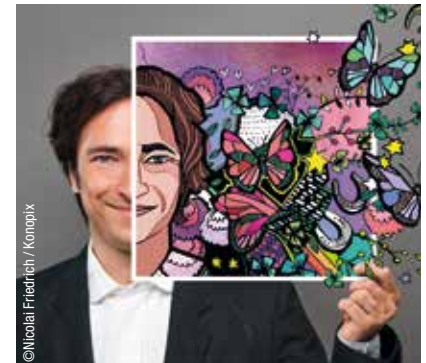

### **Cost-effective and Transparent**

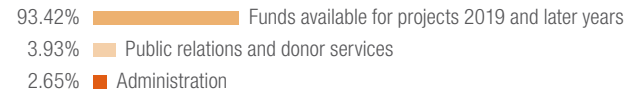
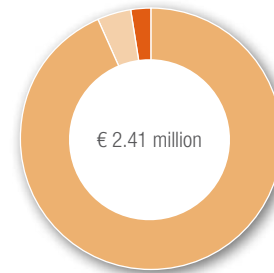

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## Education is the key to life

On the following pages, we present four selected projects to you. They stand for over 30 projects of Childaid Network in particularly poor and disadvantaged regions. Currently, these projects include around 30,000 young people in four countries and three project categories: school programs, vocational training, and projects to fight poverty and support child rights.

**UNESCO has recently published a study which shows that 617 million young people, i.e. more than 50 %, still do not learn to properly read or calculate. The problem is even worse in our project regions. A lot remains to be done.**

### Geographical focus for higher effectiveness

Our project work is concentrated on Northeast India and Nepal. In addition, we support projects in Myanmar and Bangladesh. Focus is important. Only then do we succeed in understanding the local situation, in developing sustainable partnerships, and in providing support in an effective manner.

### Emphasis on education

Content wise we also have a clear focus: We want to provide young people with access to education and vocational training. That is the best investment into their future. In doing so, we focus on disadvantaged marginalized groups like minorities, street children, refugees, and the rural youth in areas without infrastructure, the poorest of the poor, who otherwise are without any opportunities.

### From service provider to change agent

We do not create parallel structures and do not take over tasks that the government has promised to do. We see our role in initiating and accelerating change processes. Therefore, our programs include bridging courses, tutoring for exams, coaching of deprived children, and, increasingly, accompanying government schools to achieve quality education.

### Sustainable and effective

What makes our projects special: meticulous planning and piloting, monitoring of their effectiveness, and intensive personal supervision by experts.



## Ten criteria for project success

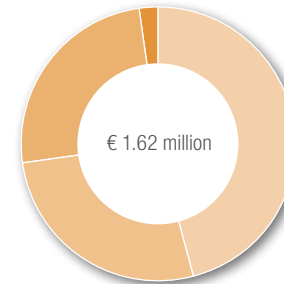
- We support the poorest of the poor

- We set goals, measure the results, and evaluate the achievements
- We define clear criteria for exit



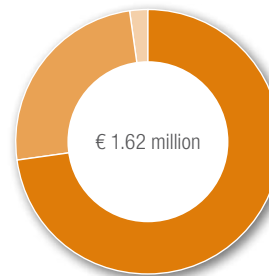

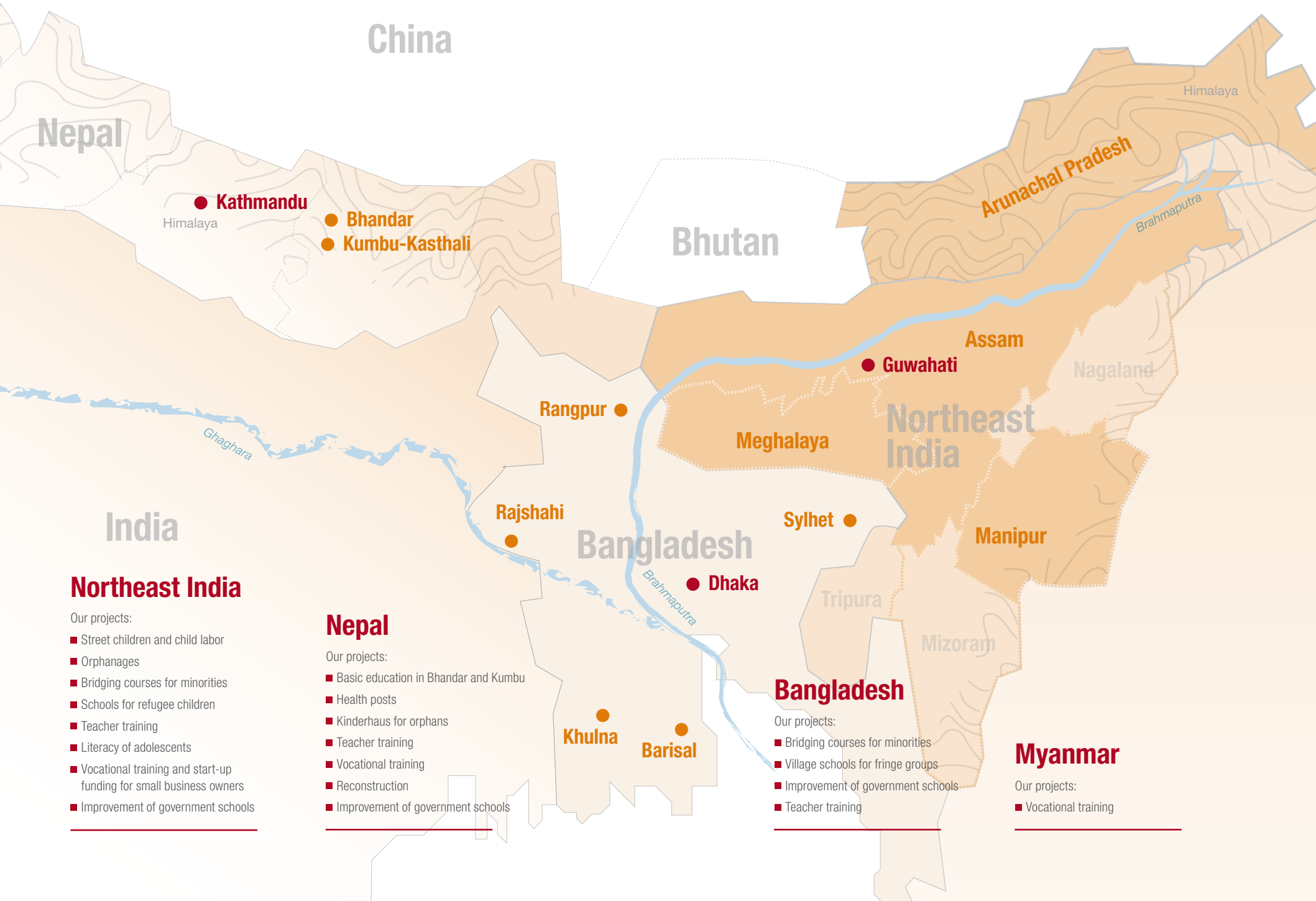

### **Northeast India – the unknown poorhouse**

We have started in Northeast India - a region as big as Western Germany with 45 million inhabitants. Little known, under-developed, with an average per capita income of less than one Euro per day, it is one of the poorest regions in the world. In the mountains of Northeast India, four out of ten children die before their fifth birthday due to malnutrition, lack of health care and poor education of their parents. Since 2009, we have been the largest relief organization there. We will continue to support the people until they have established a base and can take their lives into their own hands.

### **Nepal – emergency on the roof of the world**

Nepal is the destination of many tourists. However, the living situation of the locals is often precarious. Especially after the 2015 earthquakes, Nepal remains one of the poorest countries in the world. Away from the trekking routes, basic education remains poor and income low. So, the young men hire on as laborers abroad to secure the survival of their families. In the last 30 years, teams from Wiesbaden (Kinder-von-Bhandar) and Kronberg (Initiative Kronberg 96) have provided basic education to a whole region. These programs are now an integral part of our organization’s work.

### **Bangladesh – a country at the crossroads**

This most densely populated country on earth has made great progress in recent decades. The children mostly go to elementary school now. With micro-credits, millions have established a livelihood. However, the government lacks resources for education. In particular, the ethnic minorities in the north are neglected. We are allied with strong local partners and offer a chance to a better livelihood through education.

### **Myanmar – a country in turbulent change**

The country appeared to be on its way to democracy. In the cities, there was a sense of change and investments were made. However, the turmoil of 2018 has shown that minorities continue to face massive persecution and discrimination, also from the authorities. Not only the Rohingyas in the south, but also large parts of the rural population in the north live in abject poverty. We have started to implement a number of initially small projects with robust, well rooted partners.

## Promotion of preschool children

### Development of talent has to start early

Conventional wisdom says, “what little John does not learn, John will never learn.” Science confirms the importance of addressing all senses for the development of the children early. When toddlers are encouraged to explore their environment and to literally grasp it, then learning processes will succeed much more easily later on.

### Realities of life

The tough life in the village communities in our project regions does not provide people with a lot of space and energy to take care of small children. Often, the mother returns to the tough physical labor on far away fields immediately after giving birth. The children in the village are left to themselves. Four- to six-year-olds are already looking after their younger siblings. Diseases are overlooked, nutrition is inadequate, development is hardly being fostered.

### Our project approach

Almost all children in our project areas are enrolled into school. However, the public schools are lacking quality. Therefore, we have developed model projects and engage already at preschool age. We train child care workers who look after children in small groups during the day. Following the well-proven Montessori methods, the children playfully acquire new skills. An additional, well balanced meal, sports, and play contribute to a healthy development.

### How to continue

We scale these project models in many regions. We have the commitment of the government that they will finance these institutions – we provide our support in the start-up phase so that toddlers are well prepared for school.

### Highlights 2018

- 7 Anganwadi village schools in rural Tamenglong (Manipur) were developed into exemplary institutions
- The Kinderhaus in Bhandar was upgraded to a Montessori center and will provide day care from 2019 onwards
- In Ramechhap district (Nepal), we put special focus on the support for toddlers in preschool classes in 50 schools
- Early childhood development is an essential building block in our program for public schools in Bangladesh



### INFORMATION

Our partner AIDA has collected statistical data on child mortality via a systematic survey of mothers in the mountains of Arunachal Pradesh: four out of ten children die before reaching the age of 5.

Dr. Sunil Kaul, experienced physician and chairman of our project partner *the ant*, with his team has conducted a systematic examination of the health situation of the minority children in western Assam in the summer of 2018: 2/3 of the children are more than 5 cm shorter than the statistical reference group – a clear indication of malnutrition.

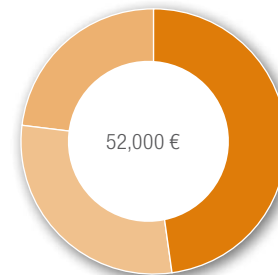

## Catching up: Basic literacy for young people

### No access to elementary education

Overwhelmingly, the adults in our project regions are illiterate. Nowadays, most of the children are sent to school. But due to the lack of quality education in public schools they are not learning much. Without a good elementary education, the people remain stuck in the vicious cycle of poverty. Therefore, in evening schools, we continue to provide adolescents with a second chance for a self-determined future.

### Development of personalities

In doing so, we pursue a holistic approach: On top of reading, writing and arithmetic, essential topics like hygiene, health and high-yield agricultural methods are taught. The diversified tuition considers the individual state of education and skills. After three to four years, the adolescents not only become literate. They also develop into self-confident personalities – and many soon assume leadership roles in their villages.

### Involvement of local leadership

Using accompanying village councils, we involve the village communities in the projects. They mobilize the young people, organize rooms for teaching and take care of the improvement of elementary schools simultaneously.

### Our goal: make ourselves redundant

Our concept proves to be sustainable: In about 400 villages, we terminated the training because our mission is completed and the elementary schools are now functioning. Instead, every year we open new evening schools in even more remote regions.

- Training of teachers in new methods
- Support of applications for birth certificates and opening of bank accounts
- Formation of self-help groups and training on how to manage money

### INFORMATION

- The project was piloted already in 2007 and extended step-by-step
- In total, almost € 1.7 million have been invested into this program so far
- Currently, we support 92 evening schools with about 3,000 students
- More than 20,000 teenagers have already become literate
- We have terminated our support in 400 villages because the elementary schools are working now

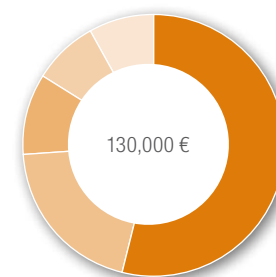

# VOCATIONAL TRAINING





## Qualification and income provide for a future

### Left behind

Hardly any of the workers on the Nepalese construction sites in mountainous Bhandar were born there. Also, in Northeast India, despite the current building boom, locals struggle to find a job. Without vocational qualification, the young people can only work as day laborers. They lose out in the competition for permanent employment.

### Qualified

During the past twelve years, Childaid Network has helped more than 150,000 young people to become literate. But reading and arithmetic alone do not fill the stomach. To create income opportunities locally and to indirectly slow down the rural exodus, Childaid Network is investing in vocational qualification. Since 2011, more than 14,000 unemployed youth have been trained in over 20 professions. Most of them are now being employed.

### Self-employed

Some work as employees. Many of our alumni try to become micro entrepreneurs. We support them by providing start-up financing, encouraging the formation of co-operatives and offering training in business planning. For the first time, in 2018, we have organized a competition to award innovative business ideas and to facilitate the exchange among like-minded people.

### What comes next?

We want to further improve the quality of the training courses with digital education materials like video clips and internet courses. We now also offer courses in information technology, for example web design. We are successfully integrating local employers: they add know-how free of charge, provide connections and teachers for our trainings – thereby improving the quality and creating opportunities for employment.

### Highlights 2018

- Two hostels for external trainees were added to the new technical center in Amguri (Assam)
- In Jorhat (Assam) we started – supported by public grants – a big center to promote innovation and start-ups
- The cooperation with local employers, such as Yamaha, Vertex Solar, Tata, Taj Hotels and others, was intensified
- In the Ramechhap district in Nepal, we successfully launched the program to provide vocational training for 1,000 young people
- In a competitive setting we identified young entrepreneurial talents whom we are now supporting further

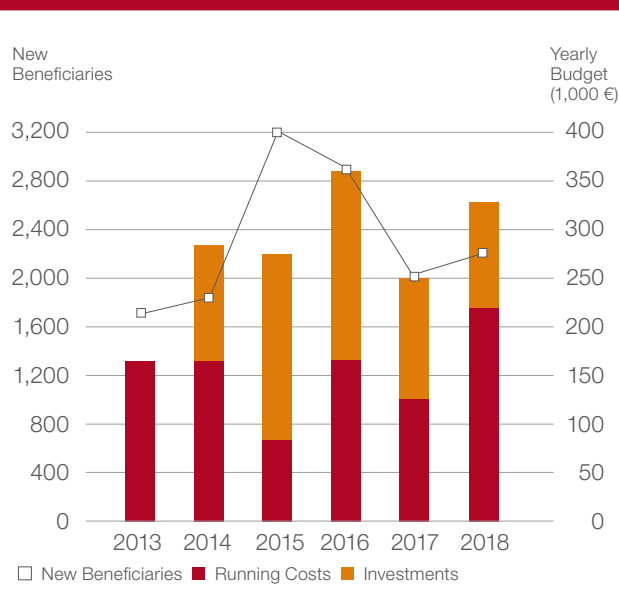

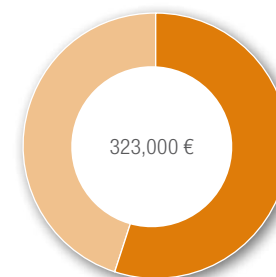

## A future for street children and children without families

### Development requires a feeling of security

Normally, families are the best environment for children. If there is no family or if it fails in the upbringing, the children need a supplementary family-like environment that provides them with the feeling of security and enables good development. A children's home is only a makeshift solution. Better care is provided by small communities like foster families.

### Caring Environment

We and our partners live up to this conviction. Wherever possible, we integrate children who ran away or were separated from their families back into their communities and support them there. In Nepal, we presently reintegrate many of the children from the Kinderhaus into their original family or into a loving foster family. These processes have to be carefully planned and must be accompanied long-term.

### Children homes can be a family substitute

However, such a solution is not available for all children. Orphans, abandoned children, children rescued from human trafficking and traumatized children as well as differently abled children need professional long-term attendance. The teams in our homes create family-like structures and are specially trained. Close, sibling-like relationships as well as the daily dealings with each other in the homes prove that integration can be achieved.

### Paths towards independence

Our assistance does not end with the coming-of-age but only with successful education or vocational qualification.

### Highlights 2018

- 86 of the 88 Snehalaya home children, who are now young adults, are pursuing a good path towards education and profession – also thanks to our continued support
- Our ambassador Mitri Sirin visits the projects for the street children in Guwahati and shares his impressions in a moving video
- The girls' home financed with the support of BILD hilft e.V. "Ein Herz für Kinder" was inaugurated in January 2018
- With the volunteering educator Hakimeh Yagootkar, we are broadening the reform-pedagogical education activities in the Kinderhaus in Bhandar

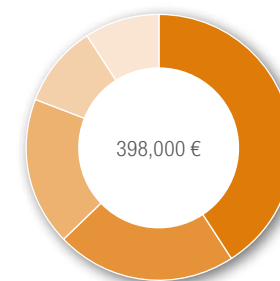

## Cross-linked with competent partners

### Strong partners abroad

In our project areas, we team up with reliable partners from the respective local background. They understand the hardships of the people, speak their language, and know what is missing. Because they are rooted there and share our vision, our projects can be implemented effectively and quickly in close cooperation with the people. In 2018, we had twenty-six such partnerships (see box on the right side).

### Alliances with like-minded people in Germany

In Germany, we ally ourselves with qualified and experienced organizations to make our projects even more effective. We jointly apply for government grants and exchange know-how. Thus, we are broadening our competences and reach. Eventually, this benefits the people in our target communities. In 2018, we had specific partnership projects with the Accenture Foundation, Die Sternsinger e.V., People in Need – Gerhard Baumgard Foundation, the Association for Development Cooperation (AGEH) e.V., Netz e.V. and Initiative Kronberg 96 e.V.

### Supporting Partners

Some organizations have financial means, but not the organizational resources to spend them effectively. They are unable to invest their funds abroad in line with their visions and cannot closely supervise such projects. 

## Notes on the Balance Sheet

### Noticeably enhanced substance

At 2,645,981 € per 31.12.2018, Childaid Network displays a year-on-year balance sheet total increase of almost 30 %. The substance of the foundation was noticeably strengthened by a supplementary endowment and further reserves. In the past ten years, the assets have more than quintupled. The level of reserves allows continuous funding of projects even if yearly incomes fluctuate.

### Reserves for sustainable implementation of projects

The liabilities side of the balance sheet displays the growth from an excellent year 2018 in all categories. The project related provisions of the previous year were used up for projects in 2018. New, slightly higher provisions were booked for a vocational training center in Assam and investment projects in Nepal for which we received public grants in 2018 that could not be invested in 2018 anymore.

As in previous years, a reserve for restricted purposes was formed according to § 62 Sec. 1 No. 1 AO. It amounts to just above 140,000 € and consists of dedicated donations which could not be spent in 2018. The unrestricted reserves were increased in line with § 62 Sec. 1 No. 3 AO by the maximum possible amount of 210,000 € up to 1,170,000 € to buffer income fluctuations in the future.

The inheritance that has been booked against claims in the previous year has now been received, enabling us to reduce claims to the usual low level.

### Development of the endowment funds

Due to a supplementary endowment of 250,000 €, endowment funds increased to 765,500 €. In addition, we hold 1.03 million € of charitable trust foundation money as special assets. The good income situation allowed us to add to our general reserves as well as to show increased funds carried forward of more than 326,000 €.

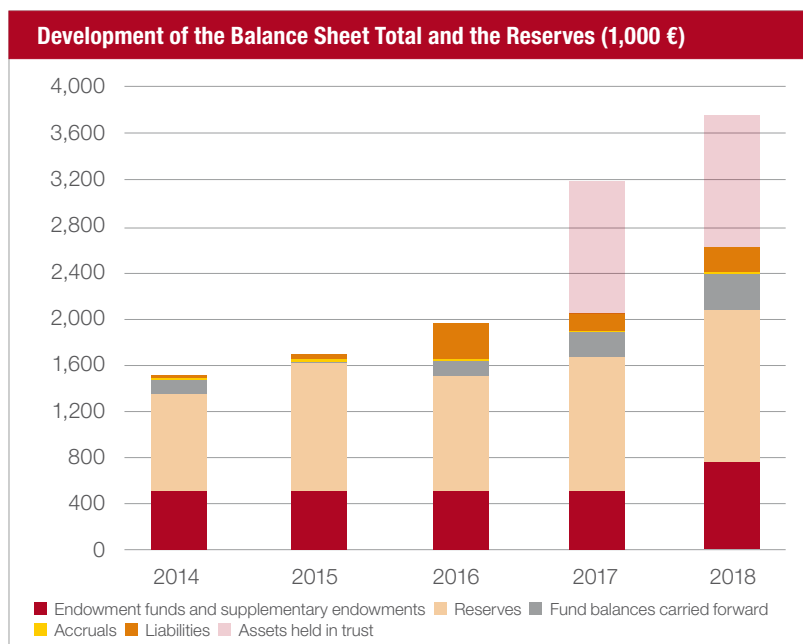
### Supervision and non-profit status

Childaid Network was recognized as a judicable foundation by the Supervisory Body in Darmstadt on April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2007 at AZ | 13-25d 04/11-(4)-146. The revenue office Bad Homburg regularly confirms the non-profit status of the foundation, most recently on July 13<sup>th</sup>, 2018.

### Audit of the annual accounts

Childaid Network voluntarily submits to various external audits. The DZI audits processes and expenses based on transparent criteria (cf. p.40). The 2018 annual accounts of Childaid Network were once again audited by chartered accountants from Baker Tilly GmbH & Co. KG, Frankfurt. On March 25<sup>nd</sup>, 2019, they issued an unqualified auditor's report and opinion.

## Notes on the Profit and Loss Statement

### Substantial increase of income

At 2.44 million € (previous year 1.62 million €), Childaid Network reports an increase of total income of more than 50 %. Especially ordinary grants (donations) grew by almost 50 % to 2.06 million € (previous year 1.39 million €). Also contributing to the growth was the over-proportional increase of other operating income by almost two thirds from 228,011.57 € to 381,218.44 €, mostly public grants for projects. The financial result of just above 12,000 € again only added a small contribution to the total.

### Increasing trust – increasing network

Very generous contributions from major donors, the deepened trust of supporting partners and the broadening of our donor network, partially with the help of charity galas, effective public relations and the support from our ambassadors, resulted in an excellent level of donations. Growing trust in our work is also evidenced by a supplementary endowment, an inheritance and many long-term commitments from donors and partners as well as the continued increase of average donation amounts.

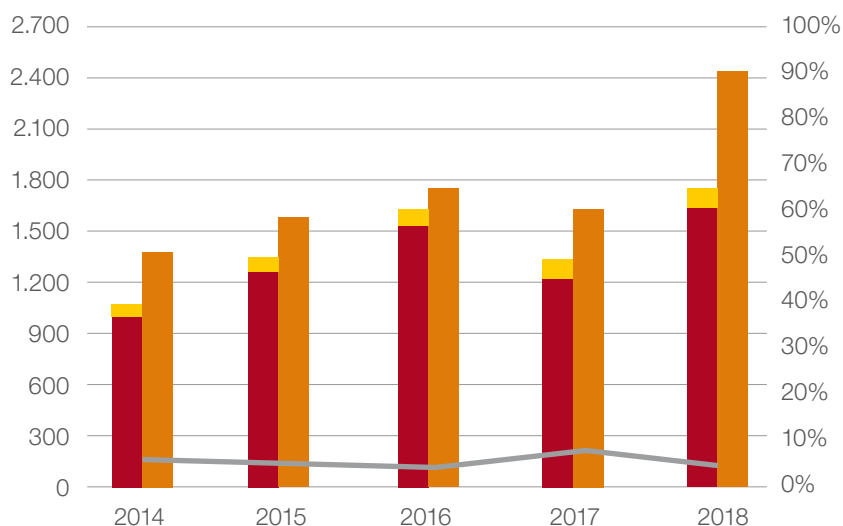
### Decreasing cost ratio

After netting out the expenses for the taxable economic business, our cost for administration, donor services, public relations and project management increased just slightly from approx. 220,000 € to only 230,000 € (by less than 5 %). Following the calculation methods of the DZI, our cost for administration, public relations and donor services are about 6.58 % of income.

### Further project expansion

Charitable activities in 2018 amount to 1.618 million € (previous year 1.194 million €), an increase of about 36 %. The outflow of funds was slightly lower at 1.567 million € because the use of accruals (reserved project funds booked in the previous year that were only paid out in 2018) was overcompensated by newly booked liabilities for expenses in 2019.

## Key Figures and Analysis

### Project expansion

Project expenditures, i.e. our investment into education projects for children, were further increased based on our growing income. 2018 project expenditures were at 1.618 million €, about one third higher than in 2017. Project work continued to be focused on Northeast India and Nepal. The foundation plans, however, to substantially expand the projects in Bangladesh and Myanmar in the coming years.

### Wide reach

With three main project pillars (school projects, street children and vocational training), we are now reaching significantly more than 30,000 young people every year. Our focus is on children and adolescents from marginalized groups such as minorities, refugees and rural youths who otherwise do not have access to education.

### Principles of funds utilization

A large part of our funds is used for salaries of teachers and social workers as well as for trainings. However, 2018 investment projects also had a significant share of project volume. 2018 we financed the construction of two children's homes in Guwahati and Bongaigaon and the building of another vocational training center in Assam. The school reconstruction work in Nepal is largely completed.

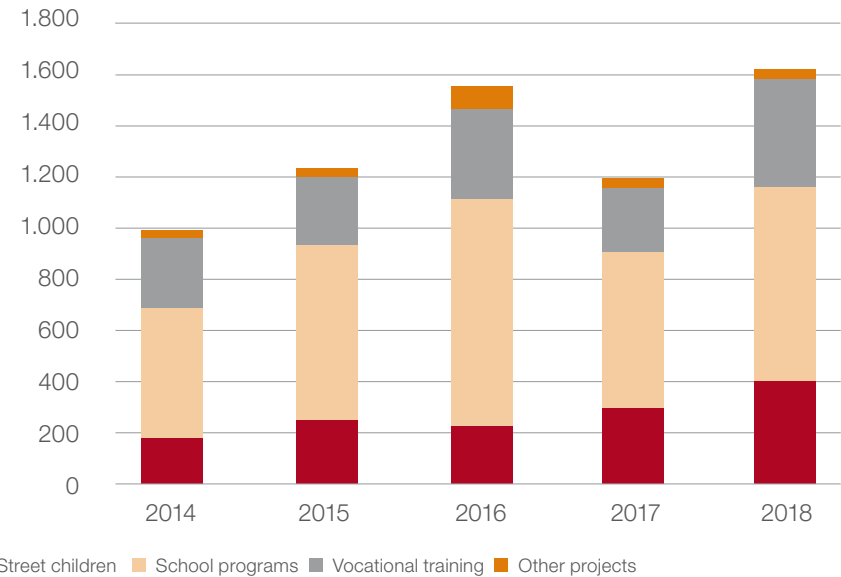

### Lean cost structure despite investments

In 2018, our total cost in Germany came to about 230,000 €, including staff cost for up to six part-time employees. Cost for donor services, including public relations, and general administration amounted to approx. 159,000 €, representing approx. 6.58 % of income, percentage-wise noticeably below last year's level (8.47 %). We have thus continued our significant growth while maintaining a very lean cost structure.

### Major voluntary engagement

Our costs are so low because the work of the foundation is mainly carried out by volunteers. Management Board, Supervisory Council, editors, graphic designers, part of the project management, web design and many other tasks are being carried out by unpaid experts. A benevolent company provides us with cost-free office space. Auditors, banks and suppliers grant us preferential terms.

## What comes next? A short outlook for 2019

We started the year 2019 with a lot of momentum. We want to make good use of the excellent cash situation due to the donations in 2018, of our grown team and of increased public recognition to achieve even more for marginalized children.

Here are some examples:

### Talent development in remote villages

Our projects are often located in difficult to reach mountain regions without infrastructure. Parents hardly know about the importance of stimulating the talents of their children. If we want to act sustainably, we have to start with the smallest: We are therefore increasingly initiating nursery schools and Montessori-centers for toddlers to support talents and develop children's joy for learning.

### Child-centered pedagogy for successful learning

Nowadays, almost all children in our project areas are enrolled in school, but learning results at the public schools are not satisfactory. We have run pilot projects to test how this can be changed with child-centered teaching and mobile teachers. In 2019, we will extend our projects to more than 300 schools.

### New partners and project regions

Together with a strong partner, we are starting to support education for 18,000 children in Northern Bangladesh, close to our focus project area Assam. In the neighborhood of our educational activities in Meghalaya, Manipur and Arunachal Pradesh, we also initiate comparable projects across the border in Northern Myanmar. In Nepal and Northeast India, we complement our work with new partner organizations.

### Working in a network

In 2019, we want to further expand our co-operation with politicians, scientists and experts to create a broader understanding on our concerns for educational justice and to perform successful advocacy work. Our projects can only have a lasting effect if the setting allows people to shape their own destiny and to strengthen their self-responsibility.
